Joshua Lawler is an associate professor in the School of Forest Resources and the College of the Environment at the University of Washington. He received his BA from Bowdoin College and his MS and PhD in ecology from Utah State University. Since then he has served as a postdoctoral fellow with the Margaret Chase Smith Center for Public Policy at the University of Maine, a research associate of the National Research Council at the US Environmental Protection Agency, and a Nature Conservancy David H. Smith postdoctoral fellow at Oregon State University. His research interests generally lie in the fields of landscape ecology and conservation biology. He is most interested in how anthropogenic factors affect species distributions, population dynamics, and community composition at regional and continental scales. His current research involves investigating the effects of climate change on species distributions and populations, exploring the influence of landscape pattern on animal populations and communities, and addressing the issue of climate change for conservation planning and natural resource management.
